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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

June 30, 2026

We would like to acknowledge that we live, and qathet Community Justice (qCJ) operates, on the traditional territory of the Tla'amin people. It is an honour to write our second President's report, as co-chairs, for qathet Community Justice (qCJ) as we continue on our journey as an independent society.

2025-2026 has been a challenging year for qCJ. Siobhan Brown left her position as Executive Director in March 2026, after several years of service. qCJ is indebted to Siobhan for putting qCJ on the map and building capacity for this program with the extensive network she built in the community, as well as throughout the province in the Restorative Justice community. The program has seen a decrease in referrals, in the past year, but some great work has been done by our youth coordinator, Chelsea Friesen, who remains committed to youth in the community.

With a decline in the number of referrals, the Volunteer Engagement Committee initiated several community Circles over the year to engage our volunteers, as well as community members, in regular Circle practice. The Community Engagement Committee has transformed into the Fundraising committee as the need to diversify funding sources has become more evident. This committee continues connecting with other community agencies and businesses to help spread the word of what qCJ is all about. qCJ held their first fundraiser, a Burger and Beer event, at the Legion in May 2026, which proved to be a huge success! The new office space has worked out well. In an attempt to raise much needed funds, qCJ has entered into a subletting agreement with another service provider.

Youth Restorative Action (YRA) at Brooks School continues to be very active in promoting qCJ values and vision through various avenues: presentations and workshops, peer conflict and crime resolution, Youth Facilitator training, community dialogues, and mentorship. The federally funded Youth Restorative Action project, ran from April 1st, 2023 to March 31st, 2026, and the data indicates that well over 500+ youth were impacted, either through youth leadership, training participants, and class presentations. With respect to criminal activity, of those youth, who completed Restorative Justice, 100% did not have further contact with police. During that time period noted above, 41 youth participated as leaders or through training, and 19 of them went on to serve as RJ caseworkers.



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We would like to thank our former qCJ Executive Director, Siobhan Brown, for her dedication to the program; and qCJ Youth Restorative Action (YRA) Coordinator, Chelsea Friesen, for the amazing impact that she has had, and continues to have, on the youth at Brooks, and in the community. We would also like to acknowledge Mara Park, who came to our organization as a practicum student, and proved to be an incredible asset to our organization with her energy, time, work ethic, and positive attitude.

qCJ is very fortunate to have a wonderful group of volunteers who see the value of this work and are giving of their time and ideas to assist with committee and case work.

Ongoing funding continues to be an issue for qCJ. We continue to work on building relationships with local businesses and organizations, and spreading the word of the value of qCJ. Unfortunately, qCJ has been unsuccessful in obtaining federal or provincial grants applied for in the past year. Our staff continue to work on researching and applying for any possible grants. We are always very appreciative of our relations with our local and provincial partners for their financial and moral support.

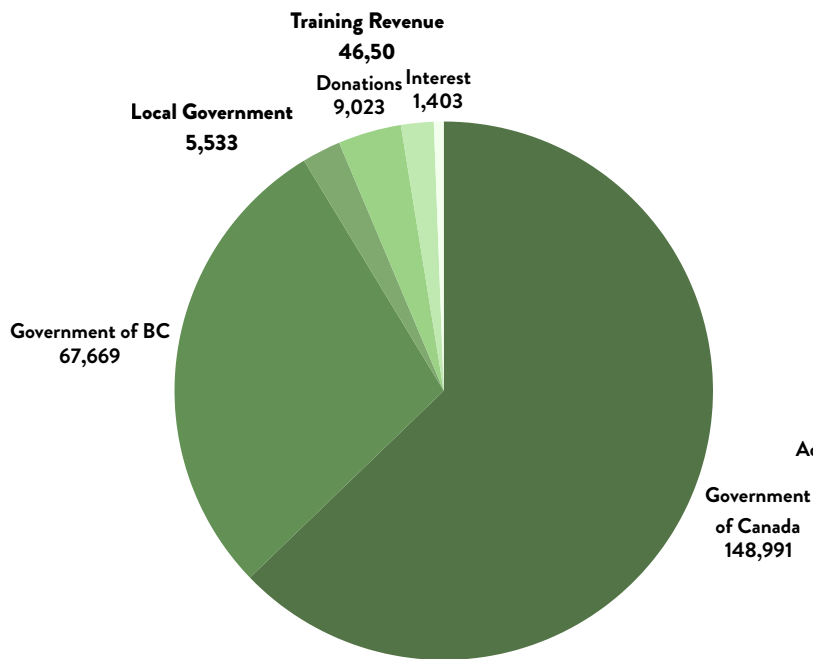

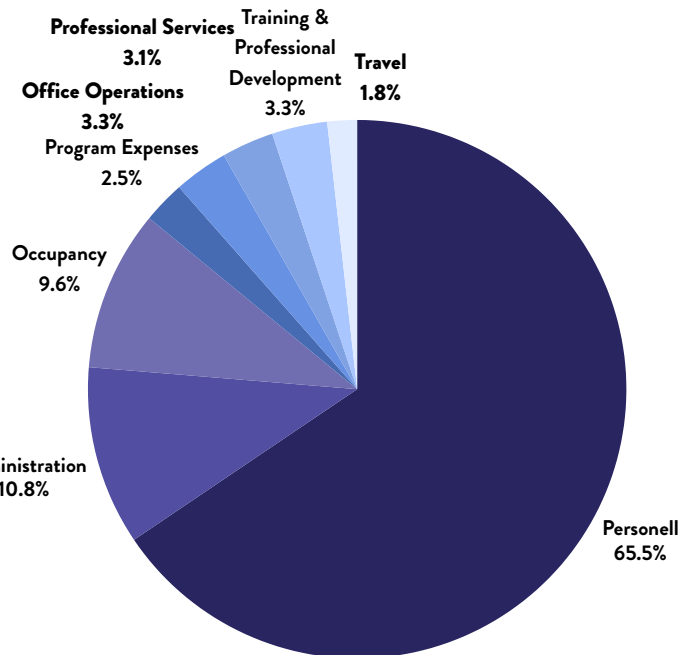

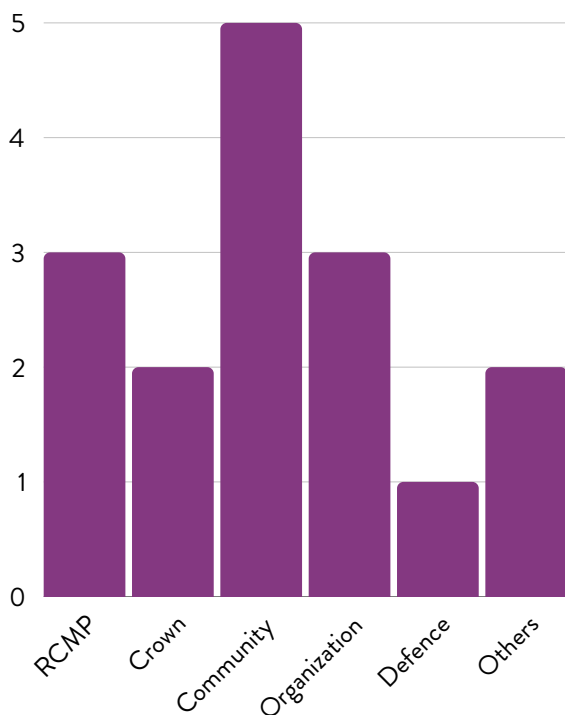

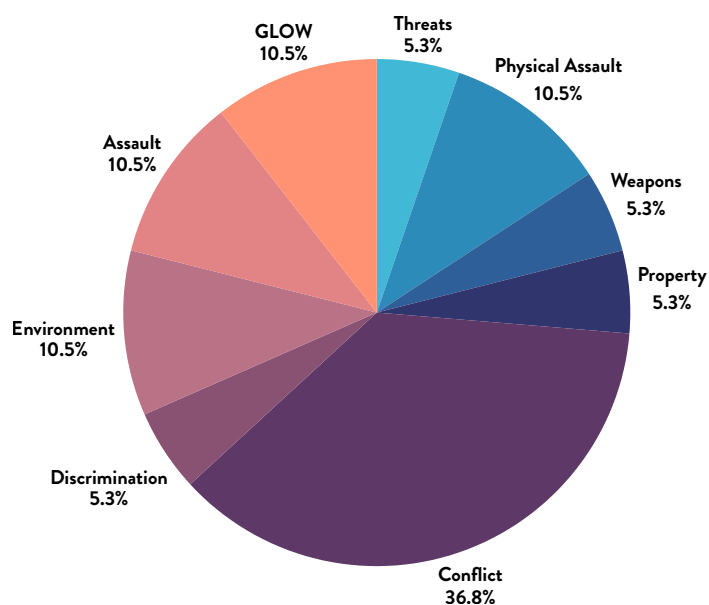


RESTORATIVE JUSTICE (RJ) CASEWORK

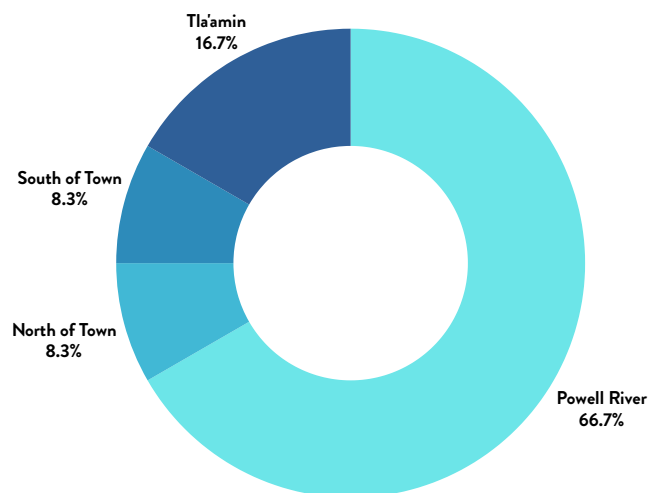

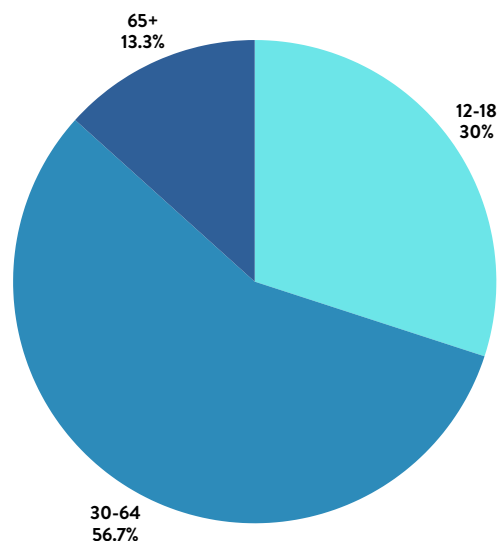

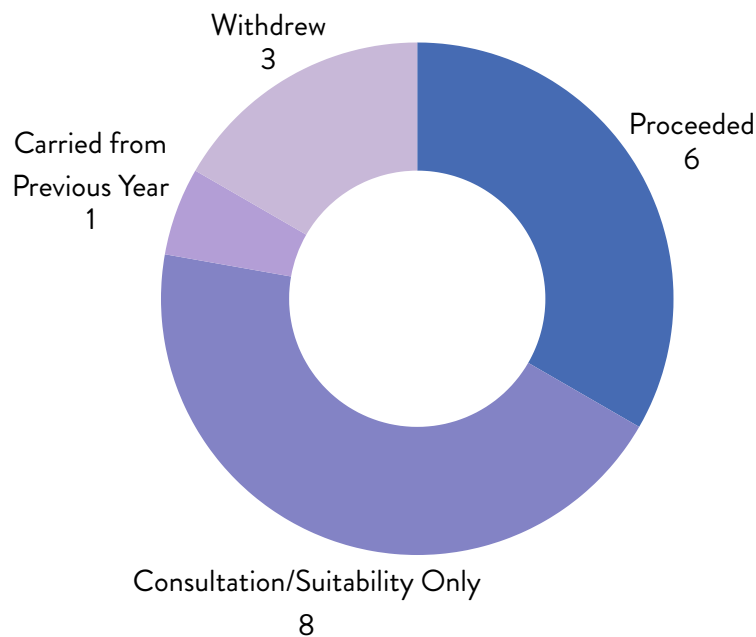
AREA of PARTICIPANTS*



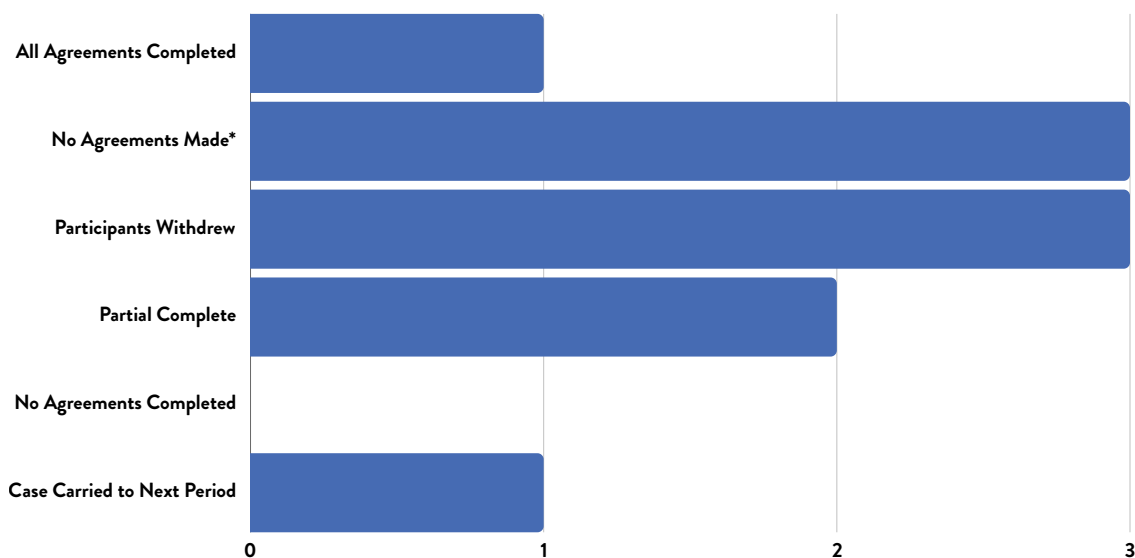
AGE of PARTICIPANTS*

GLOW (Girls Leading Our Way) Pilot

In partnership with Powell River Youth & Family, we ran GLOW, a six-week pilot program for girls ages 12-16 that focused on empowerment, healthy relationships, goal-setting, and accountability. GLOW served justice-involved girls who were unable to participate in Restorative Justice Circles, or ran alongside the RJ process. 5 girls completed the series.
